August 2008 Index Highlights:

- Scorelogix® Job Security Index™ decreased by 3.3 percent in August 2008. It now stands at 119.9 points and has declined for four consecutive months.
- All nine US Census Regions exhibited lower job security in August 2008 than in July 2008.
- More than ninety percent of all Occupational categories tracked by Scorelogix® recorded negative growth. Job Security Index™ increased only for jobs related to Installation, Maintenance, and Repair, as well as Construction and Extraction.
- The spread between the states with the highest and the lowest job security rose from 118.6 points in July to 125.2 points in August. South Dakota and Michigan are the states with the highest and lowest respective levels of job security.

Summary Overview

The Scorelogix® Job Security Index™ decreased by 3.3 percent in August, continuing the generally steady downward trend initiated in December 2007. The decrease in job security in August marks the eighth time in the past thirteen months that job security has fallen, indicating that American job prospects have worsened over the past year.

Increases in Job Security Broadening

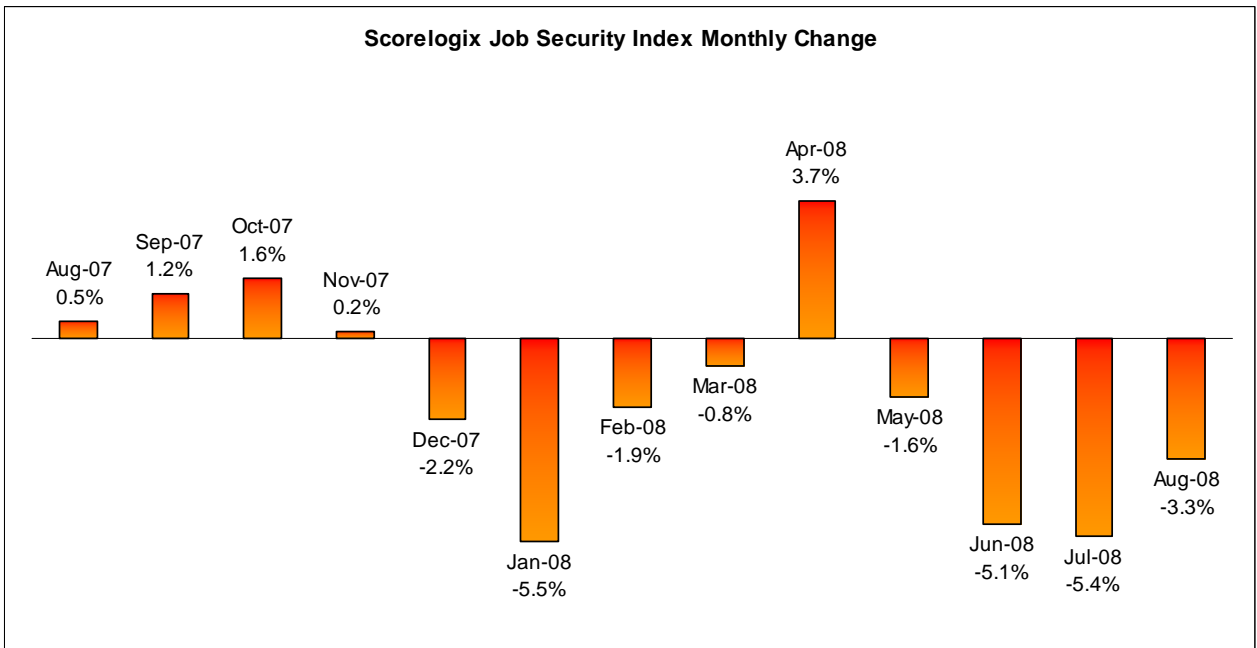
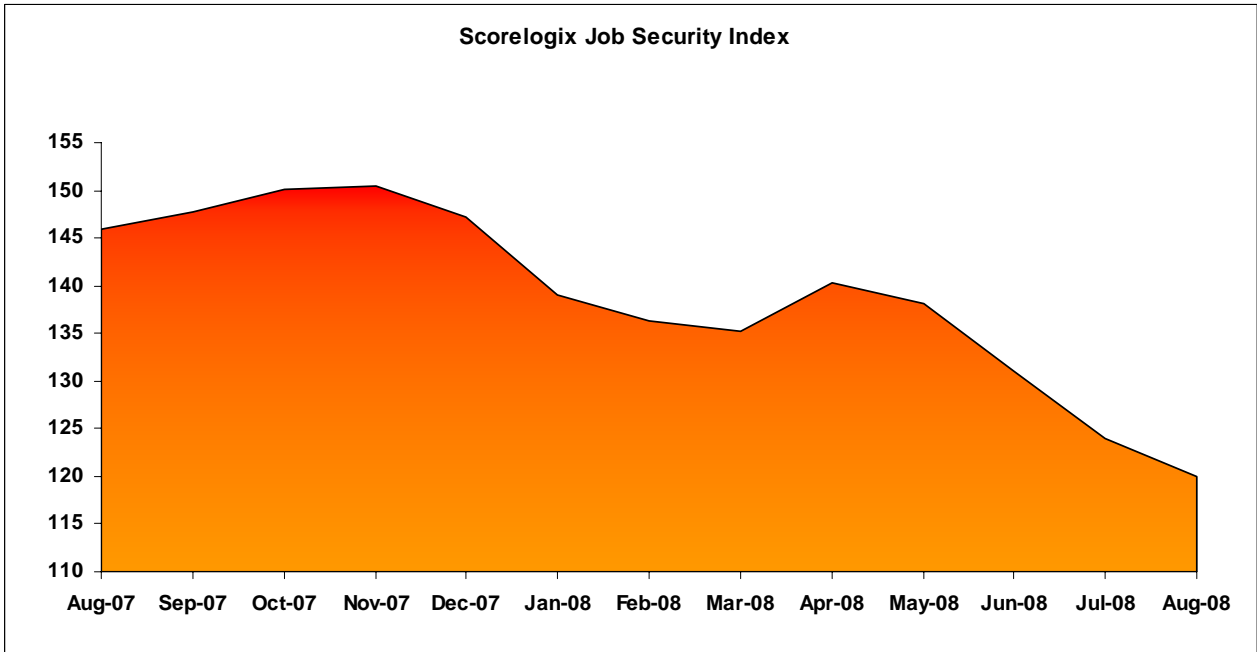
More than eighty percent of the industrial sectors tracked by Scorelogix® Job Security Index™ recorded a decrease in job security in July. However, in August, only 57% recorded a decrease. Utilities and Transportation and Warehousing recorded no change in job security, and six industries recorded growth. Of the six industries, only Mining offers jobs that are more secure in August 2008 than they were in August 2007.

Jobs More Secure in Construction and Extraction

Two occupational categories (Construction and Extraction, Installation, Maintenance, and Repair) tracked by Scorelogix® experienced positive growth in job security during August. Construction and Extraction grew 8.3 percent in August, the fifth straight month that the sector Index increased. Installation, Maintenance, and Repair registered a negligible growth margin of 1.6%. Every Occupational category is less secure than in August of 2007.

Job Security Decreases in all Nine Census Regions

All of the nine US census regions posted lower job security levels in August than in July. The West South Central region recorded the smallest decrease in job security at 2.3 percent whereas the East North Central region experienced the largest decrease at 4.8 percent.
